Introduction to Islam

<u>Islam</u> was founded in the <u>7th century</u>. It <u>shares</u> some ideas with <u>Judaism</u> and <u>Christianity</u>. Muslims believe in <u>one god</u>, <u>Allah</u>. The <u>Qur'an</u> is the Muslim <u>holy book</u> — Muslims also follow the prophet <u>Muhammad</u>'s teaching.

Islam is Divided into Two Main Traditions — Sunni and Shi'a

- 1) About <u>85-90%</u> of Muslims are <u>Sunni</u> Muslims most of the rest are <u>Shi'a</u> Muslims.
- 2) Muhammad was the <u>founder</u> of Islam Allah revealed the <u>Qur'an</u> to him. After Muhammad <u>died</u>, Muslims had to choose a <u>new leader</u> (caliph). The <u>next four caliphs</u> were Abu Bakr, Umar, Uthman and Ali.
- 3) However, some Muslims had wanted <u>Ali</u> to be the <u>first</u> caliph, and thought the first <u>three</u> caliphs shouldn't have been given the role. Others said Ali <u>shouldn't</u> be the caliph at all.
- 4) After Ali died, two groups formed the <u>Sunnis</u> and the <u>Shi'as</u>. Each group followed a different <u>line</u> of caliphs. The Sunnis <u>accepted</u> the next caliph after Ali, but the <u>Shi'as</u> (Shi'at Ali or Party of Ali) followed <u>Ali's descendants</u>. Sunnis and Shi'as have been <u>separate groups</u> ever since.

Sunnis and Shi'as have Many Similar Beliefs

Sunnis and Shi'as share many beliefs, but have some different ideas. Their basic beliefs — articles of faith — are slightly different, but they share beliefs in Allah, the holy books, prophets and a day of judgement. These, along with a belief in angels, are mentioned in the Qur'an (4:136) and other teachings, e.g. Sahih Muslim 1:4.

There are six articles of faith in Sunni Islam:

- 1) belief that Allah is the one and only god (Tawhid)
- 2) belief in angels (Malaikah)
- 3) belief in the holy books
- 4) belief in Allah's prophets (Nubuwwah)
- 5) belief in the Day of Judgement
- 6) belief that Allah knows and decides everything that's going to happen (predestination al-Qadr)

There are <u>five</u> articles of faith in <u>Shi'a</u> Islam. They're known as the <u>'Usul ad-Din</u> — <u>foundations</u> of faith:

- 1) belief that Allah is the one and only god (Tawhid)
- 2) belief in divine justice ('Adl)
- 3) belief in prophethood (Nubuwwah)
- 4) belief in the authority of imams (Imamah)
- 5) belief in the Day of Resurrection (Mi'ad)

Key Sunni Beliefs

- No one after Muhammad received knowledge from Allah. Muslims should focus on Muhammad and his way of life (sunnah — see p.19) rather than paying too much attention to Ali and his sons.
- 2) Muslims should be guided by the consensus (majority view) of the community.

Key Shi'a Beliefs

- 1) Ali was the first true caliph. Allah gave him knowledge to ensure his teaching and actions were right.
- 2) There are many branches of Shi'a Islam. They share a common belief in a line of imams after Ali, who all had the same knowledge from Allah as Ali. Shi'a imams are leaders and figureheads of the religion. They're all descendants of Muhammad. In Sunni Islam, the word 'imam' simply means 'prayer leader'.
- 3) The different <u>branches</u> of Shi'a Islam split off from each other after <u>disagreements</u> about the <u>line</u> of <u>imams</u>. The <u>Twelvers</u> are the <u>largest</u> branch, but there are many others.
- 4) <u>Twelver</u> Shi'as believe in a line of <u>12</u> imams, the <u>last</u> of whom is in <u>hiding</u> and will eventually <u>return</u>. The Twelvers are led by <u>religious scholars</u> while they wait for the last imam's return.
- 5) <u>Isma'ili</u> Shi'as (often called '<u>Seveners</u>') thought the <u>seventh</u> imam should be <u>Isma'il</u>, the <u>elder brother</u> of the one chosen by the Twelvers. The biggest group of Isma'ilis today, the <u>Nizaris</u>, think each imam can <u>select</u> the next and are still led by an imam now, known as the <u>Aga Khan</u>.

Seveners, Twelvers — sounds like maths, not RS...
