The Origins of the Universe

All religions

No one saw exactly how the Earth came to be like it is... but science and religion both have their theories.

Scientific Arguments — There are Two Main Types

Cosmological Theories — How the Universe Began

Chief amongst these is the <u>Big Bang</u> theory. It says that the Universe began in an <u>explosion</u> of matter and energy. Matter from this explosion eventually formed stars, planets and <u>everything</u> else. The Universe still seems to be expanding — important <u>evidence</u> for this theory.

Evolutionary Theories — How Living Things Changed

<u>Charles Darwin</u> argued that life on Earth originated from simple cells. Life <u>evolved</u> (gradually changed) over millions of years into a huge variety of forms, and those <u>best adapted survived</u> — 'survival of the fittest'. According to this theory, people evolved from <u>apes</u>, not Adam and Eve.

Non-religious people look to science for answers. They believe that the universe and human life came about by chance. They say that since people evolved from apes, they can't have been created by God.

Religions have their own Ideas about all this...

Some religious people believe <u>only</u> in the stories written in <u>scriptures</u>. Others believe that <u>science</u> tells them <u>how</u> the world was created, but <u>religion</u> explains <u>why</u>. They believe that God <u>caused</u> the Big Bang, and evolution is the <u>way</u> he made humans.



Christian Ideas

- 1) <u>Genesis</u> chapter I says God created everything over <u>six days</u>. On the seventh day he <u>rested</u>. Genesis chapters I and 2 describe how God created <u>people</u> in <u>his image</u>, and made <u>woman</u> from <u>man</u> (see p.3).
- 2) Some believe the Bible gives a <u>literal</u> account of what happened. People who <u>disagree</u> with evolution claim there's a <u>lack</u> of <u>proof</u> backing up the theory <u>fossils</u> don't show the <u>full process</u> of evolution.
- 3) However, lots of Christians view the creation story as <u>symbolic</u> and also believe in scientific theories. The <u>Big Bang theory</u> was actually first put forward by a Roman Catholic priest, <u>Georges Lemaître</u>, so religion and science <u>don't</u> have to be completely <u>separate</u>.
- 4) In fact, many believe that <u>science</u> and <u>religious</u> ideas can exist in <u>harmony</u>. Both the <u>Church of England</u> and the <u>Roman Catholic Church</u> have recognised the <u>benefits</u> of the two working together.

Jewish Ideas

1) The Jewish creation story is in Genesis and is the same as the Christian one (see p.3).

"So God created mankind in his own image..." Genesis 1:27 NIV

- 2) Jews interpret this story in <u>different ways</u>. Ultra-orthodox Jews believe it is <u>literally</u> true, and would find it <u>difficult</u> to accept <u>scientific</u> arguments.
- 3) Others would argue that the Torah account is a metaphor, and are open to scientific evidence.

Islamic Ideas

- 1) The Muslim creation story is <u>similar</u> to that in Genesis: "It is Allah who created the heavens and the earth and whatever is between them in six days" (Qur'an 32:4).
- 2) The Qur'an says Allah "began the creation of man from clay" (Qur'an 32:7) and breathed life and a soul into the first man, Adam and all humans descend from him.
- 3) Some see the descriptions of <u>creation</u> in the Qur'an as <u>agreeing</u> with <u>science</u>. E.g. the Qur'an says "Have those who disbelieved not considered that the heavens and the earth were a joined entity, and We separated them..." (Qur'an 21:30) this could be understood to <u>support</u> the <u>Big Bang theory</u>.
